Action carried out to:	
-embed biodiversity into decision making & procurement	The Council commits to encourage biodiversity wherever possible.
-raise awareness of biodiversity & its importance	Within the minutes and on the website.
-safeguard principal species and habitats	Committed to managing the trees and grounds – Fedw wood is managed and insured by an independent group. Trees there are monitored frequently. Trees at the old school grounds are monitored annually.
-restore & create habitats and resilient ecological networks	Fedw wood is already a biodiverse habitat.
-tackle negative factors: for e.g. reduce pollution, use nature based solutions, address invasive species	No invasive species, pollution or flytipping identified.
-use, improve and share evidence	Via Minutes and Website
-support capacity, and/or other organisations	Raise awareness of other local organisations, such as Bwlch Village Hall, Tretower Village Hall and Cwmdu Village Hall.
Key outcomes: use narrative and metrics where possible	Annual Visual Inspections and updates in Council
Review points, for e.g. enablers and barriers to action, improvements to forward plan	Resources (small Council £17,262 precept with one part time member of staff), volunteers project groups are hard to gather and retain.
How and when will the s6 duty be monitored and the s6 plan reviewed?	Annually via report to Council by Clerk. Next monitor and review Summer 2024.
